
#### Valley Regional Proudly Scores 4-Star Rating for Second Consecutive Year

In 2016, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) introduced star ratings on Hospital Compare to make it easier for consumers to choose a hospital. This is to help consumers understand and compare the delivery and quality of care in their area. The ratings build on a larger effort to create a health care system that delivers better care, spends health care dollars more wisely, and results in healthier people.

The ratings reflect patients' experience of care at almost 3,500 Medicare-certified acute care hospitals. The ratings are based on how well nurses and doctors communicated with patients, responded to patient needs, cleanliness, and other important measures. In 2017, Valley Regional received a 4-star rating, the highest of all local hospitals for the second year in a row.



## Highlights in the coming year...

#### One system, one medical record.

We will move to a new system that will consolidate medical records for our hospital and clinics in one place. This will improve and streamline the system for our patients and our providers, reducing wait time, as well as duplication of information collection and work.

One patient portal will mean all your information for test results, appointments, and educational materials are more readily accessible.

#### Telemedicine in the Emergency Department

For a small critical access hospital like Valley Regional, partnering with Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center for eEmergency services enables us to offer increasing access to highly specialized care. The service will offer access to additional board-certified emergency physicians 24/7.

It supports faster activation of emergency transport teams, when time is of the essence. During multiple emergencies, telemedicine offers additional clinical support. The consultation reduces transfers, so patients can stay close to home.





#### Valley Regional Outpatient Services (V.R.O.S)

Our location on Main Street in Newport now offers a variety of rehabilitation services, including two specialties: HandHealth and pelvic floor physical therapy. HandHealth, with Certified Hand Therapist Cynthia Weinberger, OT/L, CHT moved into the space to consolidate our clinics into one location, just around the corner from Valley Regional Primary Care Providers.

Meghan Soby, DPT, provides pelvic floor physical therapy, as well as general physical therapy. Physical therapy is a new service offered in Newport, as we expand to meet the needs of our community.

Valley Regional was again named "Most Wired" Rural and Small Hospital for IT connectivity, as published in Hospitals and Health Networks.






#### Our Volunteer Program






#### **Ladies Union Aid Society**




